Dear Commissioners:

This letter is in reference to the commission's consideration of the licensing of new low power radio stations. As a corporate executive for a group which holds several community radio stations, I must say that I am deeply concerned about the prospect of the commission allowing additional low power stations to take the air. The main consideration in this issue for the commission should be whether or not these stations are needed and can they actually serve the public interest?

Through deregulation, the AM and FM bands have seen an onslaught of new stations taking the air. Quite frankly, this has diluted the quality of broadcasting and the licensing of additional stations has not proved to be in the public's best interest. Why then consider allowing additional stations to take the air and simply crowd the band? One of the primary directives of a broadcast station is to serve the public interest as a public trustee. To do this, a commercial licensee needs some market exclusivity in order to have a revenue base to fund their operations.

Operating a broadcast station takes a significant amount of capital and revenue and the licensing of additional stations will put the future of legitimate stations who are actually serving the public interest in jeopardy. Keep in mind that all of our profits are not simply deposited into our bank accounts. Our revenue allows us to purchase and maintain equipment to stay in operation. It allows us to hire news directors to keep the public informed of local events. It gives us the ability to purchase weather receivers, radar screens, and other equipment needed for

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emergencies. For the majority of communities in the country, their local radio station is their source for information and their lifeline during emergencies. Additionally, by protecting the currently licensed stations the commission will ensure employment for many thousands of **professional** broadcasters, as well as allowing existing stations to be financially stable and contribute to the tax base and economies of their respective communities.

The AM and FM bands are overcrowded at the present. Licensing additional low power radio stations will simply serve to increase the effect of this problem, confuse listeners, and would be detrimental to the established community radio stations. But more importantly, it would undermine the current licensee's ability to serve the public interest, which they have been doing so effectively since KDKA took the air as the first commercial radio station early in this century. Community radio stations have been and always will be a vital, integral part of the communities in which they operate...provided they are afforded a reasonable amount of exclusivity within their communities. Don't jepordize existing stations and their ability to serve the public interest. After all, that is the purpose for our existance, it is our common goal. I am staunchly against the licensing of low power stations. If adopted this proposal will be a disservice to the public and put the commission in direct conflict with the directives which it is entrusted to protect and advance.



I AM AGAINST THE LICENSING OF THESE STATIONS. THEY WILL ENCROACH ON THE SIGNALS OF STATIONS CURRENTLY LICENSED AND THAT INTERFERENCE WILL DISTURB THE LISTENER & CREATE UNDUE PROBLEMS FOR OUR LISTENING AUDIENCE.

MY STATION PROVIDES LOCAL SUPPORT TO EVERY LOCAL AUTHORITY, CHARITIES, & IS USED BY ALL THE CITIZENS FOR PUBLIC SERVICE ANNOUNCEMENTS. DURING THREATENING WEATHER, WE CONSTANTLY ARE SOUNDING THE ALARM BY WAY OF EAS & BROADCASTING TO THE PUBLIC. THE STATION IS ON THE AIR 24 HOURS A DAY & CAN BE REACHED ANY HOUR OF THE NIGHT BY WAY OF PHONE.

I RESPECTFULLY SUBMIT MY OPINION THAT COMMUNITY RADIO IS SERVING THE PURPOSE FOR WHICH IT WAS LICENSED AND THAT LOW POWER STATIONS ARE REDUNDANT AND WOULD BE INTRUSIVE TO QUALITY RADIO SERVICE.
