Dear Ms. Dortch:

On November 18, 2002, Paul Withington and Glenn Morris of Time Domain Corporation, David Hilliard of Wiley, Rein and Fielding, and I met with Ed Thomas, Julius Knapp, Mike Marcus, Alan Scrimme, John Reed, Ron Chase, Don Campbell, Richard Fabina, David Means, William Hurst and Steve Jones of the Office of Engineering and Technology.

We provided a brief demonstration of Time Domain's through-wall radar device, RadarVision, and discussed our Petition for Reconsideration filed in response to the Commission's First Report & Order on UWB. We discussed the operation of the Radarvision 2000 device in detail including specific uses by law enforcement and public safety personnel. We urged the Commission to adopt the changes in the First Report & Order Time Domain proposed in our petition to allow through-wall radar devices to operate at Part 15 Class B levels (broadband emissions levels of up to -41.3 dBm eirp). We discussed restrictions on the devices that currently exist under the rules including: use only by law enforcement and public safety personnel; a limit on the number of units that may be sold, coordination with federal agencies, and registration.
