Dear Ms. Dortch:

On Friday, November 21, 2003, Lawrence Krevor, Vice President – Government Affairs, Nextel Communications, Inc. (“Nextel”), Dr. Gregory L. Rosston, Deputy Director of the Stanford Institute for Economic Policy Research at Stanford University, and I met with Sam Feder, Legal Advisor on Spectrum and International Issues to Commissioner Martin, regarding the Commission’s above-captioned rulemaking on public safety communications in the 800 MHz band. During this meeting, we discussed the study authored by Dr. Rosston entitled “Using the Commission’s Articulated Spectrum Policy to Evaluate the Alternatives for Mitigating 800 MHz Interference,” filed with the Commission on Thursday, November 20, 2003. In his study, Dr. Rosston examines how the three proposals for resolving 800 MHz public safety interference fit with the overall spectrum management direction articulated in the Commission’s Spectrum Policy Task Force Report (“Report”). Dr. Rosston concludes that the Consensus Plan for 800 MHz Realignment, even though it was developed before the release of the Report, is more consistent with the Report’s goals and methodologies than either the Motorola Plan or the UTC/CTIA proposal.
