Sir, I am exceedingly concerned about the proposal to run broadband net access over power lines. This would effectively destroy much HF communication. Think about how many signals are on the shortwave bands: marine and aero traffic, weather, emergency communications in disasters, international broadcasters, hams, the Red Cross, the military, etc. Do you want to close shortwave for effective communications?

The BPL industry--apparently aided by "Nirvana" Abernathy--say BPL won't ruin the shortwave spectrum. Proof that they're lying

In its Reply Comments, ARINC, Inc, the communications company of the air transport industry, reports that it had to abandon the use of a frequency at its Half Moon Bay, California, facility because of interference from a Part 15 device that could be five miles away and that the FCC has been unable to locate. So much for the lack of interference complaints or the ease of resolving them under existing Part 15 regulations--the regulations that the BPL industry wants relaxed even further.

PLEASE do not throw away our shortwave spectrum to satisfy the greed of a few! There are lots of other ways to run broadband
